Second Week of April: Witnesses of the Resurrection (1 Corinthians 15:1-11)

■ Welcome

“Hosanna” is an urgent prayer meaning, “Save us now.” In which area of your life do you most desperately need the Lord's help right now? Let's also share one thing you received through last week's Grace Time.

■ Text: 1 Corinthians 15:1-11

■ Introduction

Today is Easter Sunday, the day the Lord rose from the dead. The resurrection is the core and foundation of the Christian faith.

What definitively distinguishes the Christian faith is the resurrection of Jesus Christ. By faith in the risen Lord, we believe that we too will be resurrected and live forever. The hope of the resurrection completely transforms our perspective on death. However, if Jesus had not risen, then the Gospel, salvation, and hope would all be in vain.

(1 Corinthians 15:14) **“And if Christ has not been raised, then our preaching is in vain and your faith is in vain.”**

So how can we be certain of Jesus' resurrection?

The resurrection is not merely a belief but a fact established on evidence. The surest way to determine the truth of an event is through the testimony of witnesses. Jesus' resurrection was not a secret event but a public one—a historical event witnessed by countless people. Paul uses the testimony of these witnesses to affirm that Jesus' resurrection was a real event that actually took place.

■ Observation Question: Who are the witnesses of the resurrection, and what did they testify to?

Answer 1. The prophecies of the Bible are the witnesses of the resurrection.

Jesus' resurrection was not a random event, but one that God had already foretold. (1 Corinthians 15:3-4) **“For I passed on to you as of first importance what I also received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures.”**

The Apostle Paul clearly states that Jesus' death and resurrection were events that took place “in accordance with the Scriptures.” The Old Testament prophets consistently prophesied the Messiah's death and resurrection. They testified that there would be One who would die and rise again, and that He is the Messiah.

(Isaiah 53:5) **“He was pierced for our transgressions; He was crushed for our iniquities...”**

The prophet Isaiah describes the Messiah’s death not as a simple martyrdom, but as a substitutionary death.

(Psalm 22:16-18) **“Dogs have surrounded me; a band of evildoers has encircled me; they have pierced my hands and my feet. I can count all my bones; they stare at me and gloat; they divide my garments among them and cast lots for my clothing.”**

This psalm specifically describes the death of Jesus on the cross, where His hands and feet were pierced and His garments were divided by casting lots. We see that this prophecy was fulfilled exactly as foretold in history. Now let us examine the prophecies regarding the resurrection. These words point beyond David to the Messiah.

(Psalm 16:10) **“For you will not abandon my soul to Sheol, nor will you let your Holy One see corruption.”**

Ultimately, God foretold the Messiah’s death and resurrection through the prophets, and Jesus died and rose again exactly as all these prophecies foretold.

🌸 Application Question 1

1) As we see how the Old Testament prophecies (Isaiah 53, Psalm 22, Psalm 16) were specifically fulfilled in Jesus’ crucifixion and resurrection, in what areas of my daily life can my trust in God’s Word be applied in a new way?

Answer 2. Jesus’ twelve disciples are witnesses to the resurrection.

(1 Corinthians 15:5) **“He appeared to Cephas (Peter), and then to the Twelve”**

The sure evidence of the resurrection lies in the testimony of these disciples. When Jesus went up to Jerusalem, He clearly foretold His death and resurrection more than three times. In Jerusalem, the Lord clearly foretold the betrayal, suffering, death on the cross, and resurrection on the third day that would befall Him. However, the disciples did not understand these words, nor did they believe them (Luke 18:34).

Even after the resurrection, when the women brought the news of the resurrection, the disciples did not believe it.

(Luke 24:10-11) **“These women were Mary Magdalene, Joanna, and Mary the mother of James. They and the other women with them told this to the apostles, but the apostles did not believe them, thinking their words were nonsense.”**

The disciples were hiding in doubt and unbelief. However, after the resurrected Jesus appeared to them personally on several occasions, and after receiving the Holy Spirit, the disciples were completely transformed. They no longer feared death; instead, they boldly testified to Jesus’ resurrection and proclaimed that Jesus was the Messiah. They were witnesses who testified exactly to what they had seen and heard.

(Acts 4:19-20) **“Peter and John replied, ‘Judge for yourselves whether it is right in the sight of God to obey you rather than God. For we cannot help speaking about what we have seen and heard.’”**

They preached the gospel even while enduring flogging and persecution, and they regarded their suffering as glory. If the resurrection were a lie, such a transformation could not be explained. For no one would risk their life for a lie invented by humans.

🌸 Application Question 2

1) Like Peter and John, who confessed, “We cannot help speaking about what we have seen and heard” (Acts 4:20), what grace of the resurrection should I boldly testify to in my life?

Answer 3. In addition, there are about five hundred other brothers who are witnesses of the resurrection.

These are the ones who witnessed the risen Lord until His ascension.

(1 Cor. 15:6) **“After that, He appeared to more than five hundred brothers at one time; most of them are still alive, though some have fallen asleep.”**

The Apostle Paul states that there were about five hundred witnesses in addition to the Twelve Apostles. In particular, these were the ones who saw, heard, and fellowshiped with the risen Lord “at one time.”

(Acts 1:9) **“After he had said this, he was taken up before their very eyes, and a cloud hid him from their sight.”**

This was living proof that people at that time could verify. Therefore, Jesus’ resurrection is not a vision experienced by a few individuals, but a historical event witnessed by many people in the same way.

🌸 Application Question 3

1) Am I living as a “living witness of the resurrection” to those around me (family, friends, neighbors)? Let’s discuss specifically how we can live as witnesses.

Answer 4. James and the Apostle Paul are witnesses of the resurrection.

(1 Corinthians 15:7-8) **“Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles, and last of all, as to one born out of due time, he appeared to me.”**

James, Jesus’s biological brother, did not believe in Jesus as the Messiah during His ministry. However, after the risen Lord appeared to him, his life was completely transformed; he became a leader of the Jerusalem church and guided the community with spiritual authority.

The Apostle Paul, too, was someone who, more than anyone else, did not believe in Jesus. As a Jewish leader, he persecuted the church and arrested believers. However, after encountering the risen Jesus on the road to Damascus, Paul’s life was completely transformed (Acts 9:3-5).

(1 Cor. 15:9) **“I am the least of the apostles, unworthy to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God.”**

Ultimately, the transformed lives of James and Paul and their testimonies powerfully prove that Jesus’ resurrection was a real event.

🌸 Application Question 4

1) James, who did not believe in Jesus, and Paul, who persecuted the church, were completely transformed after encountering the risen Lord. What aspect of my life has been most profoundly changed by the gospel and my faith in the resurrection?
